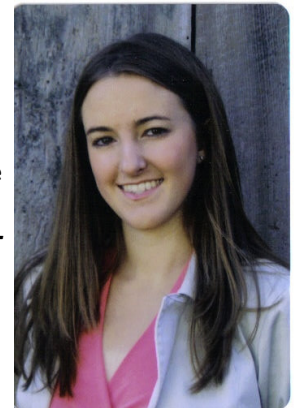


MACKENZIE AGIN

DANIELLE HENRY

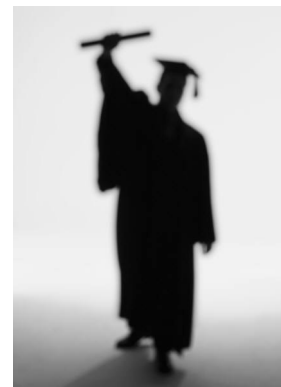

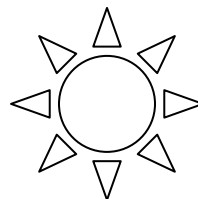

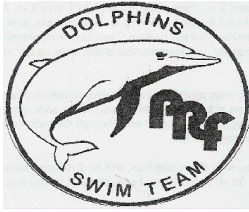

Counseling Corner

Having attended several graduations this year, (and might I say that the Graduation at Northwest was outstanding, I was ever so impressed with the high quality of young people graduating, well done parents and teens!) An emphasis on what the young people had accomplished, and hopes to accomplish in the future were shared with great excitement. I wondered what kind of legacy they had been given from their parents, obviously the parents had instilled a value in education with all the Cum Laude's and Honors and such, but I wondered about other internal and external messages and legacies.

You see I believe a legacy worth leaving is a legacy worth living. It is not enough to leave a legacy on integrity or love or truth...it is more important to live out these characteristics while you're alive. By definition a legacy is what you leave behind or what you are remembered for.

You see, my hope is to be a living legacy to my kids now. That doesn't mean I'm perfect, Carol, my wife, will attest to that, but I am always conscience of my attitude and actions. I know little and big people are always watching and listening. So if I am out in public, I have a social responsibility to provide a positive, healthy, passionate living legacy.

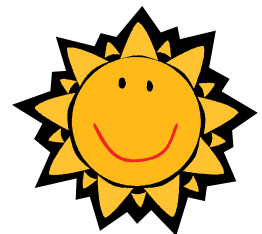
