President's Update



Did you know that Pleasant Run Farms is the second most populated area in Springfield Township? There are about 5,000 of us who know that it's a great place to live. And continuing a tradition started decades ago, your Pleasant Run Farms Civic Association continues to work diligently to maintain the Farms as a vibrant and exciting community. In April, we had the PRF Spring Celebration with our annual Easter Egg Hunt. On May 18 th the Farms has its Garage Sale. And, on May 21 st we have the PRFCA Spring General Meeting to discuss the many significant items that affect all of us living in the Farms.

Important Meeting

We will have a very important PRFCA General Meeting on May 21 st at 7:00 pm at John Wesley Methodist Church. We'll discuss the significant parking and access problem at Pleasant Run Elementary and review the school board's proposed solution to correct this problem. At this time, 2 children have been hit in the parking area.

We'll also have Chris Gilbert, Springfield Township Administrator and TJ Ackerman, the developer of the Welch property at the General Meeting to discuss the impending home development. The 2 key issues to be discussed are tax abatement and project landscaping between existing homes and the new construction. This is the time to contribute your thoughts on the development of the 30 new homes.

Streets

As I mentioned last month, Mike Gould, Springfield Township Public Works Director, mentioned that the Township is purchasing road repair equipment that will give them the ability to grind the existing asphalt and apply new paving in small areas. Mike, with the PRFCA Board are identifying areas in the Farms that are between 25' – 200' that need immediate repair. These repairs may effect some of the State grant funding that will be requested for streets in poor condition. This critical factor will be significant in determining the repair areas.

Swim Club

We really need volunteers to help us with the spring-cleaning of the Swim Club. We need to paint the 3 pools and clean the pool patio areas before we fill the pools for the 2019 season. We also need to paint the exteriors of the Swim Club buildings. Additionally, we need a few green thumb gardeners to help us with the plantings in the pool area. The Swim Club is the heart of Pleasant Run Farms, help us keep it beating strong.

PLEASANT RUN FARMS ATHLETICS 2019

Spring has come and kids are outside playing. The ball fields at Clifford George are filled with kids playing baseball and Tball. PRF coaches have assembled their teams together with new faces as well as past players. Practices started the week of March 18. Opening Day for most teams was Saturday April 13. This spring there will be 6 Tball teams, 5 baseball teams playing in the Northwest league, and two select baseball teams.

Matt Heller is back running the overall spring sports organizations. Matt has been active as Baseball Commissioner of PRF for several years, and coached in PRF for even more. He grew up in PRF and started playing Tball when he was 4 years old. He knows the sport well and has done a terrific job in encouraging players to sign up and recruiting parents to become coaches. He has seen many of the players on our Clifford George fields and continues to encourage parents to sign up their kids each year.

Tim Higgins has overseen our Tball program for six years and will again this year. He has coached at PRF for eight years. He returns this year as a coach of one of our teams. Tim has developed a consistently outstanding Tball program that parents and kids love. In our community Friday night in the spring is known as **Tball Night!** They own the fields at Clifford George on Friday night. All 6 teams play on the two fields. It's hard to tell who is having more fun – the kids or the adults. If you want to see families having fun, come to Clifford George on a Friday night this spring.

Help needed with PRF Athletics

Remember when we were kids. We played sports or became a member of the Scouts or maybe even learned to fly model planes. Whatever, the parents were an important part of our lives. They were there to help guide us, coach us, instruct us. Our parents were an important part of us growing up and we became better players, scouts, and members because of them. Now we are those parents. Kids today cannot play on teams without parents helping. And PRF needs your help. Like all organizations PRF Athletics requires a lot of people to help run our spring and fall programs. It relies on parents to coach teams, oversee equipment and uniforms, maintain the fields, operate the concession stand, and more.

There are a lot of teams, a lot of players, and a lot to do each season. There only so many Matts and Tims to run the programs. All of us are volunteers and do this part time. We need a few adults to help with these areas:
Field maintenance We need several adults to help keep the fields in playing shape. There are three chief areas of focus:

Grounds maintenance The primary responsibility is cutting the grass during the playing seasons. PRF has a mower at the fields to use. This can be flexible as to when it is done – evenings, afternoons, weekends.

Field prep We help the ball teams by prepping the two fields - dragging the baseball fields as needed before practices and games. Again, we use the lawn mower to drag the two fields.

Landscaping We keep the Clifford George area looking nice by keeping the area presentable. A little attention to the bushes and trees enhances the whole area. This includes trimming bushes and controlling weeds, especially around the flagpole, concessions, and the two fields themselves. There are tools and weed sprayers in the building at the fields.

PRFAA Treasurer pays the bills, keeps a budget of the sports and makes occasional deposits. The Treasurer prepares the money to pay umpires and referees each week. This requires about 2 -3 hours per week during the sports seasons. The Athletic Association is made up of volunteers. Anyone can pitch in and get the job done. You can be a parent, you can be retired, or you may have some extra time and want to give back to the community you live in.

Today's Recipe

Five-Spice Tilapia

- 1 pound tilapia fillets
- 1 teaspoon Chinese five-spice powder
- ¼ cup reduced-sodium soy sauce
- 3 tablespoons light brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon canola oil
- 3 scallions, thinly sliced

01 Sprinkle both sides of tilapia fillets with five-spice powder. Combine soy sauce and brown sugar in a small bowl.

02 Heat oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium-high heat. Add the tilapia and cook until the outer edges are opaque, about 2 minutes. Reduce heat to medium, turn the fish over, stir the soy mixture and pour into the pan. Bring the sauce to a boil and cook until the fish is cooked through and the sauce has thickened slightly, about 2 minutes more. Add scallions and remove from the heat. Serve the fish drizzled with the pan sauce.

Roger's Landscaping Tips!

The daylight hours are expanding and the temps are slowly warming. It may seem this year and last have experienced relatively slow starts. However it won't be long, as lawns are greening and some shrubs and trees are budding. Now is the time to prepare the flower beds, trees, shrubs, and lawn for a new season of growth. The following tips may provide a healthy jump start for your landscape.

*** Clear all debris from the existing beds ie; broken branches and leaves (especially leaves gathered at the base of shrubs).

*** Rake through or turnover the old mulch. This allows loosening of the compacted mulch for water and air flow.

*** Application of a light fertilizer and weed control such as preen will enable a fresh start for your new plants. If the previous layer of mulch reveals some thickness and no sign of mold or fungal growth, just a light fresh layer of double or triple shredded mulch will suffice. It may be necessary to remove older mulch before applying a new layer should the mold, whiteish appearance reveal during the raking stages noted above.

*** Pruning dead branches from shrubs and trimming/thinning trees ie; Bradford Pear, Maple and Evergreens is recommended now. This must be done before the Spring budding and flowering begins (very important for health of the plant).

*** The lawn should receive an early Spring fertilizer treatment (root stimulation and greening jump start) as well as a pre-emergent weed control for crabgrass and the dreaded dandelion germination.

Suggestions for May:

*** Generally this is the month for fine tuning the flower beds. A clean edge cut around the bed ensures the containment of your fresh mulch. I prefer the first two weeks of May for mulch application. Mid May to mid June is my preference for annual plantings. I found that waiting closer to mid June and Father's Day allows deeper discounts at garden centers. In addition, the seasonal weather patterns tend to be less severe and Spring blossoms have finished the cycle. The beds will keep their shape and clean appearance longer without continual rework.

Warmer days are approaching.....Happy Gardening.

GIS Technology Used At Beech Grove Cemetery

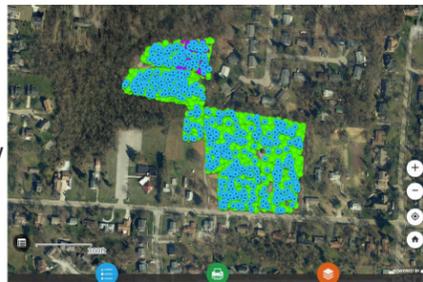

When discussing the preservation of cemeteries, the first question that must be asked and answered is, "who owns the cemetery?" There are basically three types of ownership in Ohio: township, municipal and private.

Ohio laws pertaining to cemeteries under the jurisdiction of townships can be found in Ohio Revised Code (ORC) Chapter 517; ORC Chapter 759 pertains to cemeteries under the jurisdiction of municipalities (cities, villages and joint municipal/township cemeteries); ORC Chapter 1721 pertains to cemeteries under the jurisdiction of (private) cemetery associations.

Springfield Township Maintains two cemeteries, Smiley Cemetery and Beech Grove Cemetery.

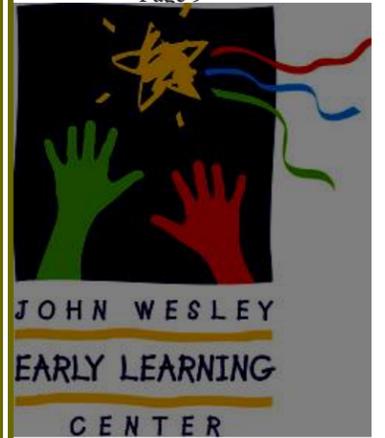
Save the Date! Come join in on the Pleasant Run Farms Annual 4th of July Parade!

8 Low Cost Ways to Boost Your Home's Curb Appeal

Now that spring has finally sprung, it is time to head outside and work on your home's curb appeal. Small projects can have a big effect, especially if you can inspire your neighbors to do it also! Might even be worth teaming up and working together with a neighbor to help get these projects completed. Glam the Front Door

Adding pizzazz to your home's front entrance is an easy, low-cost way to up your home's curb appeal. Try painting your door a pretty hue that coordinates with your home's color. Make sure there is a contrast between the front door and the facade of the home. If your house is gray or white with black shutters, consider painting the front door red. Other ways to beautify your home's exterior are adding appealing house numbers to your entrance and hanging a pretty wreath on the door. For extra pop, place a potted plant or two by the front entrance.

Manicure the Lawn

Tending to your lawn is a do-it-yourself task that can add instant curb appeal to your home. Get out the lawn mower, cut the grass regularly and conquer those weeds. It's always a great idea to edge your lawn for a professional look. Spread some Weed n Feed now, before the weeds take over!

Tend Those Beds

Groomed garden beds show that a home has been well maintained. Start out by weeding your planting beds and removing any debris. Buy a few bags of mulch and spread enough of it to cover the width and length of

your home's front beds. The mulch will give your landscaping a fresh appearance and will keep weeds to a minimum while retaining moisture for your plants.

Try planting some annual flowers like pansies, black-eyed Susans, impatiens and petunias for quick and long-lasting color. The flowers can be bought already in bloom in low-cost flats of 12 to 48 flowers at garden and home improvement stores. Annuals grow quickly, are inexpensive and bloom for a while. Consider planting brightly colored annuals in the spring and summer and plant flowers with autumn hues (reds, oranges and yellows) in the fall. Changing it up every so often gives a fresh new feel and look.

Wash Off Dirt

Turn the nozzle on your garden hose to its strongest setting and use the water to blast dirt and debris off sidewalks, your driveway and the front of your home. Be careful not to dislodge or get any water underneath your home's siding. You could rent a power washer at an extra cost, but you probably don't need to go to the trouble — a simple garden hose can do the job, and a power washer can be too powerful and could damage siding. There are local companies

who can pressure wash your house and clean your exterior windows for you also.

Tidy Up the Driveway

Neighbors won't be impressed by your garbage or recycling containers, so store those on the side of the house (preferably behind a bush, a small fence or a screen) or in the garage. Take care of minor cracks in your driveway by patching or resealing it yourself. Determine how much sealant you'll need by using the length and width of your driveway to calculate its square footage. Then match that up against the product's use recommendations. Plan on getting 10 percent extra because some areas will absorb more than others. You can always return unopened pails of sealer, or offer them to a neighbor.

Make the Windows Sparkle

Clean windows inside and out to make your home sparkle. If your home's windows tilt out, it's quite simple to wash exterior windows. Otherwise, you might need a friend or family member to steady a ladder while you do the work. Try washing outside windows by spraying them with a garden hose to remove dirt and cobwebs. Then sponge them down with a small amount of

vinegar or detergent diluted in warm water and rinse. If you need to wash your windows from the outside and your windows don't tilt out, try using a long-handled brush.

Update Light Fixtures

Removing builder-grade or outdated front door or garage light fixtures will instantly brighten your home's curb appeal. Make sure the breaker inside the electric panel is shut off for where the light is being installed. Before touching any wires, test them with a live-wire testing device.

If you don't want to go to the expense of buying new light fixtures, you could try painting or spray-painting your old ones for a fraction of the cost. If you have outdated light fixtures like 1980s gold, the quickest fix is to paint the light fixture black.

Trim Trees and Bushes

Your home needs to be visible from the curb in order to have curb appeal, so cut overgrown bushes and trees, removing branches that block walkways, windows, the driveway and views of the home from the street. People need to see the front of the house.

Except for very large tree limbs, you most likely can use a pair of hedge or pruning shears for the job. If you don't have your own pair of shears, look into borrowing a set from a friend or neighbor to keep costs down.

Around the Farms

Spring has arrived with all its beautiful colors and smells.

The Farms are filled with beautiful trees and flowers. Our yards are looking so lush with the new sprigs of grass poking up in everyone's yard. All of it a start of a new beginning in 2019. Many of us will be growing flowers that can be cut and brought into our house for display in a vase. Here are a few tips on how to keep the different varieties living longer.

- Aster...cut them when 3/4 to fully open. Scrape the stem...
- Azalea...cut when the bud starts or in full bloom. Scrape and crush stem...
- Carnation...cut when fully open and snap the stem...
- Chrysanthemum...cut when fully open, break off and scrap the stem...
- Dahlia...wait until fully open and scrape the stem or sear in a flame...
- Geranium...cut when fully open and scrape the stem...
- Hydrangea...wait until fully open and sear the stem in a flame...
- Lilac...cut when 1/2 to fully open. Scrape stem; float wilted branches in 110-degree water for an hour...
- Poppy...the night before the flower opens...sear stem; put a drop of wax in the heart of the flower to keep it open...
- Rose...wait until second petal unfurls. Cut stem just above a 5-petal leaf or the plant will stop blooming. Scrape the stem.

May the beauty of Spring and Summer now also live in your house.
